COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- A. This course helps officers comprehend the history of the Vietnam War.
- B. Officers critically analyze four books and communicate their findings to the class.
- C. Officers will relate the experience and lessons of the Vietnam War to 21st century security challenges.

REQUIREMENTS

This elective is a colloquium, a class in which officers read and discuss a wide range of books on a particular subject—in this case, the Vietnam War. Student-led discussions and instructor lectures comprise the format of the class. The discussions focus on the individual readings officers will complete, while the lectures give a broader overview of the topic.

There is no research paper.

Every one reads the common textbook, plus four additional books from the attached list on pages 3-6 of this syllabus. We select books on the first day of class.

Officers write four evaluation papers, one for each selected book. The evaluation papers have to convey the author's argument, explain how the argument is made, evaluate his or her success in doing so, and summarize your overall evaluation of the book; a successful essay evaluates and analyzes a book's arguments.

Each paper is due at noon the day prior to the seminar; officers will send electronic copies to everyone in the class by that time. Everyone needs to read each paper before class and develop a question for discussion. Each officer prepares a 5-minute tabletop presentation on his or her book that not only covers the high points of the written assignment, but also covers elements not covered in the essay. Everyone will field questions about the book they read.

Professor Weaver is the author of *The Air War in Vietnam*. Texas Tech University Press, 2022 and *Guard Wars: The 28th Infantry Division in World War II*. Indiana University Press, 2010. He has been teaching this course since 2003 and updates it every year.
